Stella's Circle is an award-winning, nationally celebrated community organization with a mission to help transform lives through Real Homes, Real Help, and Real Work. Our team provides wrap-around housing, mental health, and employment services to our community's most marginalized individuals.

Stella's Circle provides services to 1,500 adults each year who face many barriers to fully participating in their community. These barriers include mental illness, addictions, trauma, poverty, homelessness, criminal justice involvement, low literacy, and long periods of unemployment.

As a charitable organization, we are governed by a volunteer Board of Directors and supported by the Stella's Circle Foundation Board which raises funds for our participant-focused programs and services.

# What We Do



#### Address the need for safe, affordable housing:

Brian Martin Housing Resource Centre is a lifeline for those seeking stable housing. Our walk-in housing help connects people experiencing homelessness with housing options to support movement out of shelters and unsafe living conditions. Beyond this, our team offers eviction prevention work to maintain housing stability and safety.

Naomi Centre is Newfoundland and Labrador's only emergency homelessness shelter for young women and gender diverse people ages 16–29. We offer safe, temporary housing within a harm reduction model. Our staff provide person-centered housing services to both current and former residents of Naomi Centre.

We are proud to be the 3<sup>rd</sup> largest provider of affordable housing in Newfoundland and Labrador, with 133 units and counting. Much of that housing is supportive housing, connecting tenants to dedicated staff for wrap-around supports.

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I know staff at Naomi Centre got my back, you never have given up on me. Even when I have.

# Offer a range of mental health services to underserved community members:

Community Support Program provides the highest level of support to enable adults with severe and persistent mental health needs to live in community. Our goals are to help participants avoid hospital visits or incarcerations, remain stably housed, and improve their quality of life.

Emmanuel House is the only community-based residential program for mental health and addictions in the province. Individual and group counselling is offered through long term residential stays and day treatment, with support to help participants transition back into the community.

Just Us Women's Centre is the only program in the province dedicated to supporting women with criminal justice experience. Both at the NL Corrections Centre for Women in Clarenville and in St. John's, we offer a variety of individual and group counselling, release planning, advocacy, and support services.

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Emmanuel House helped me see things in myself that I never knew existed.



# Believe that everyone can contribute to community in ways that are meaningful to them:

**Individual & Group Employment Services** help people identify their own needs and goals to move toward work, school, and greater self-reliance. We help participants increase their employment readiness, discover their skills and career opportunities, and prepare to enter the workforce.

Social Enterprise Training teaches employment skills and on-the-job learning through placements at our social enterprises in the food industry, commercial cleaning, and construction trades. We also offer short-term, transitional work through CanDo! for adults facing significant barriers to employment.

Adult Basic Education Level 1 teaches foundational literacy and math through delivery of the standardized provincial government curriculum, enriched with other dynamic and community learning activities.

Stella's Circle Inclusion Choir is a joyful place of acceptance for participants, staff and volunteers who share in a love of singing. Through group singing, the Inclusion Choir fosters social connections and belonging, where each community member's voice is valued and heard.

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Stella's Circle is there to help people achieve their highest ability.

Stella's Circle welcomed Caribou Legion Manor into our housing portfolio in the fall. This gift from the Caribou Legion Manor Association Board increased our affordable housing by 48 units, greatly helping us surpass our strategic goal of 100 units by 2025. This expansion is a significant step forward in meeting the growing demand for affordable housing in our community.

We will continue to honour the original mandate of Caribou Legion Manor as affordable housing for seniors 55 years and older with a focus on veterans. A generous donation from the Rotary Club of St. John's is helping us transform the apartment building into more accessible, inclusive homes for residents and provide subsidized housing for veterans in need.

Our annual Pancake Breakfast for Homelessness was hosted by Gower Street United Church in February. Thanks to a team of volunteer servers from government and community leadership, we not only served delicious breakfast from the Hungry Heart Café to the public, but also complimentary seating for frontline housing workers across the community sector.



The federal Rapid Housing Initiative awarded funding to Stella's Circle to build new transitional housing, along with municipal and provincial contributions. Our project creates 15 new housing units dedicated to women who are experiencing homelessness and have involvement with the criminal justice system. The building will also become the new home of our Just Us Women's Centre in 2025.



We grew our team this year with the addition of a Peer Supporter, CSP Case Manager, and two Community Mental Health Workers. With a bigger team, we are able to respond to the growing need for additional intensive case management and mental health support for our community's most vulnerable.

The Peer Supporter position is made possible thanks to the funds raised at our annual Shopper Drug Mart Run for Women, which raised \$75,000 in 2023 for our women's programs. This role increases the ways we support women seeking help at Naomi Centre and Just Us Women's Centre.

A new four-year partnership between Just Us Women's Centre and the E. Fry Society of Mainland Nova Scotia is bringing record suspension clinics to the province. More commonly known as "pardons," this life-changing process gives women with criminal justice histories a clean record check, removing a large barrier to employment, education and housing.

Stella's Circle was honoured to receive the Mental Health Leadership Award from the Canadian Mental Health Association of Newfoundland and Labrador in recognition for the innovative horticultural therapy programming our team offers at the Newfoundland and Labrador Correctional Centre for Women in Clarenville.

I got released from court after I was at Clarenville [prison]. I spent the whole night wandering on the streets downtown. Then I found a card in my pocket with the address of Just Us on it. The staff there found me shelter for the next night, got my income support, and got me some clothes. The next day I even got to go back and join them for a Christmas cooked breakfast. I can't say what it meant to feel safe overnight.






We celebrated the incredible impact our 35 social workers make across our organization for National Social Work Month. Stella's Circle is proud to be the largest provider of field placements in the province for the School of Social Work, Memorial University.

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Emmanuel House changed my life. When I got into the program, I not only fought for my life again, but I found stability. I have hard days and good days, but I've learned to live with both equally. I don't just like myself when things are good, I like myself now all the time. Emmanuel House taught me to give myself the best chance I can.







We are thrilled that the Employment Stability Pilot program we've been co-developing with provincial government and Choices For Youth has been expanded to include all income support recipients across Newfoundland and Labrador. People who receive income support in NL who begin a new job or continue to work can now keep more of their earnings and immediately experience increased financial supports and benefits from working. This is a shift towards progressive, person-centered policy creating important system change. These improvements will empower people facing barriers to make the changes they seek in their lives.

Our summer Green Team installed double the number of raised garden boxes over last year with some impressive teamwork. Marking the 8<sup>th</sup> year of partnership with Conservation Cops Newfoundland and Labrador, this is a valuable employment opportunity for young adults in our community who face barriers to entering the workforce.




This is an opportunity I wouldn't have found on my own. Stella's Circle helped open doors to work I couldn't.


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So happy today is Wednesday and I get to go to Choir. I wait for this all week. I love singing with my friends, they're like my family.


